Reaching the Age of Majority (Age 18) for Students with Disabilities in Wisconsin

Once a student with an IEP reaches the age of 18 the educational rights provided to parents transfer to the student unless the student has a legal guardian. These educational rights include:

- · the right to receive notice of and attend the IEP meeting,
- · the right to consent to an evaluation,
- · the right to consent to a change of placement, and
- the right to use <u>Dispute Resolution Options</u> to resolve a dispute. These may include: <u>IEP Facilitation Mediation State Complaint Due Process Hearing</u>

While it is important for all parents to be aware of the transfer rights, it may be more critical for parents of a student with a significant intellectual disability who may continue to need adult support.

Ensuring a High-Quality Education for Highly Mobile Children

A <u>new guidance letter</u> was issued in November 2022 by the Office of Special Education Programs. It provides guidance and describes several important principles that states, school districts, school staff, parents, families, and others may find helpful in ensuring that highly mobile children with disabilities receive required special education and related services designed to meet their unique needs in a timely manner.

Resources for Families Coping with Mental and Substance Use Disorders

Research shows that family support can play a major role in helping a loved one with mental and substance use disorders. This website offers an abundance of resources that may be helpful.

Using Picture-Based Task-Analytic Instruction to Teach Students with Moderate Intellectual Disability to Email Peers without Disabilities

Collaboration and communication are important components of life skills curricula for students with moderate to severe intellectual disabilities. One way to promote collaboration and communication is through the use of technology. This preliminary study investigated the effects of using picture-based task analyses and an iPad to teach students with an intellectual disability how to send and reply to emails. Three middle-school-aged students with an intellectual disability as well as three peers without disabilities participated in this investigation. The intervention consisted of two 15-step task analyses: one for sending an email, and the second for replying to an email, least to most prompting, and constant time delay. Results showed students improved the ability to send and reply to emails on an iPad with the support of picture-based task analyses. Implications for practice and future research are also discussed.
